

Pre-Baptism preparation is required. Please contact the office at least one month before the desired date.


The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick Please notify the office if you or a family member is in the hospital or homebound and would like a pastoral visit.

Hello. Happy Easter!

We will be in the Easter season until Sunday, May 20, Pentecost Sunday. So continue to celebrate Jesus' resurrection from


the dead and the gift of eternal life to us.

This weekend we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday or the Feast of Divine Mercy. St. Maria Faustina Kowalska, was a polish nun who heard Jesus tell her to call people to a renewed devotion to the Divine Mercy of Jesus. Pope John Paul II, in 2000, canonized St. Faustina and declared the Sunday after Easter to be Divine Mercy Sunday. Divine Mercy Sunday is important today, maybe even more so than in the past. I know a lot of people just assume everyone, or almost everyone, goes to heaven. We have to remember that Jesus said, "Enter through the narrow gate; for the gate is wide and the road broad that leads to destruction, and those who enter through it are many. How narrow the gate and constricted the road that leads to life. And those who find it are few." (Matthew 7:13-14) Balance that with St. Faustina saying over and over again how desperately Jesus desires to save souls. So we can't be lazy in our relationship with Jesus. We need to work in availing ourselves to Jesus' saving grace and be transformed. We must not assume our salvation. However, nor should we be discouraged (that only a "few" find the narrow road that leads to life). What we do need to do is ask and pray to receive Jesus' Divine Mercy.

According to the weather forecast, we are suppose to come out of our deep winter a little this week. I believe some snow is still forecasted, but that by the end of the week we might even get around 50. So we'll see. I'm sure the farmers are itching to get into the fields. I'll say some extra prayers.

You will notice that the Feast of the Annunciation is celebrated this week, on April 9th. The normal date for the Annunciation is March 25 (9 months before Christmas!) Because this year March 25 fell on Palm Sunday, that day trumped the Annunciation. The feast is then celebrated on the next available date. This year both Holy Week and the Octave of Easter take precedence and so the first available date was April 9. The Annunciation of Our Lord is too important to just not celebrate, as would happen with a memorial for a saint, so we still celebrate it, just at a much later date. Remember to commemorate this feast on Monday– pray the Angelus or the Magnificat, and thank Jesus for taking on human flesh to save us from our sins.

Divine Mercy Sunday April 8

Jesus spoke to St. Faustina: "My daughter, tell the whole world about My Inconceivable mercy. I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of



graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment.*[our emphasis] On that day all the divine floodgates through which grace flow are opened. Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet. ..."

...the Lord's desire for the Feast includes the solemn, public veneration of the Image of Divine Mercy by the Church, as well as personal acts of veneration and mercy. The great promise for the individual soul is that a devotional act of sacramental penance and Communion will obtain for that soul the plenitude of the divine mercy on the Feast. The image of Divine Mercy will be on display near the altar at St. Teresa all day on Sunday. Stop by to venerate and pray for mercy.

Sunday Bible Reflections with Dr. Scott Hahn

Three times in today's Psalm we cry out a victory shout: "His mercy endures forever."

Truly we've known the everlasting love of God, who has come to us as our Savior. By the blood and water that flowed from Jesus' pierced side (see <u>John 19:34</u>), we've been made God's children, as we hear in today's Epistle.

Yet we never met Jesus, never heard Him teach, never saw Him raised from the dead. His saving Word came to us in the Church—through the ministry of the apostles, who in today's Gospel are sent as He was sent.

He was made a life-giving Spirit (see <u>1 Corinthians 15:45</u>) and He filled His apostles with that Spirit. As we hear in today's First Reading, they bore witness to His resurrection with great power. And through their witness, handed down in the Church through the centuries, their teaching and traditions have reached us (see <u>Acts 2:42</u>).

We encounter Him as the apostles did—in the breaking of the bread on the Lord's day (see Acts 20:7; 1 Corinthians 16:2; Revelation 1:10). There is something liturgical about the way today's Gospel scenes unfold. It's as if John is trying to show us how the risen Lord comes to us in the liturgy and sacraments.

In both scenes it is Sunday night. The doors are bolted tight, yet Jesus mysteriously comes. He greets them with an expression, "Peace be with you," used elsewhere by divine messengers (see Daniel 10:19; Judges 6:23). He shows them signs of His real bodily presence. And on both nights the disciples respond by joyfully receiving Jesus as their "Lord."

Isn't this what happens in the Mass—where our Lord speaks to us in His Word, and gives himself to us in the sacrament of His body and blood?

Let us approach the altar with joy, knowing that every Eucharist is the day the Lord has made—when the victory of Easter is again made wonderful in our eyes.
