From the Heart - by Fr. Kern

Thank you all for the many prayers you sustained us with this past week on our mission trip. It was a moving and incredible experience for our youth! We have one final camp for our junior high group in early August with five of our youth signed up to go. I am very happy with how things have gone this summer and it has made many months of planning and hard work pay off! I need to especially thank Carol Cyr in our office who really took on the brunt of the work to communicate with the youth organizations hosting the events as well as parents to organize and plan paper work (youth trips create government amounts of paperwork). Additionally we had much work to plan fundraising and budgeting to offset much of the cost for the trip. We will need to plan and work out how to continue this ministry into the coming school year. Thank you for all you sacrificed to make this possible.

Let's you think that I only care about the youth of our parish, I encourage you to rest assured that the next plan is to continue to revitalize adult faith formation in our parishes. When I arrived two years ago, the largest gap I noticed in ministries was in the youth programs. I knew action needed to be taken to build up this ministry and we have much work to do still to keep it running consistently. I have asked much from parents and am still hoping for a more full response from many who initially sounded eager to help. With that said, coming quickly this fall we will be providing unique opportunities for adults to grow in their faith in a more deliberate way as well. Time and again I am witnessing parishes that provide discipleship groups of some variation have borne much fruit in deepening the faith of its members. With much help from Deacon Chris and also the direction of the Diocese of Winona we are moving forward to provide some opportunities for adults to join a faith group unique to their life. We will be publishing more details in the weeks ahead so please be on the lookout for opportunities to say yes to a group that will help you grow in your own journey of faith. We will have a group of leaders from our parishes trained by sometime in September to lead these groups and though they will not be perfect at it, they will be your peers who are open to growing in their faith with you. Although this will not be the only means of adult faith formation to come, as members of the Body of Christ we are always in need of journeying more intentionally with other people. We need a group of friends to encourage us and support us in the faith and to know that others are making the same, although unique, journey we are on ourselves. Please know that God is moving in our parishes and is raising up these opportunities to draw you to Himself. I am grateful for you and your generous response to these opportunities ahead.

Sunday Bible Reflections with Dr. Scott Hahn

Today's liturgy brings together several strands of Old Testament expectation to reveal Jesus as Israel's promised Messiah and king, the Lord who comes to feed His people.

Notice the parallels between today's Gospel and First Reading. Both Elisha and Jesus face a crowd of hungry people with only a few "barley" loaves. We hear similar words about how impossible it will be to feed the crowd with so little. And in both the miraculous multiplication of bread satisfies the hungry and leaves food left over. The Elisha story looks back to Moses, the prophet who fed God's people in the wilderness (see Exodus 16). Moses prophesied that God would send a prophet like him (see [Deuteronomy 18:15-19](#)). The crowd in today's Gospel, witnessing His miracle, identifies Jesus as that prophet.

The Gospel today again shows Jesus to be the Lord, the good shepherd, who makes His people lie down on green grass and spreads a table before them (see [Psalm 23:1,5](#)).

The miraculous feeding is a sign that God has begun to fulfill His promise, which we sing of in today's Psalm - to give His people food in due season and satisfy their desire (see [Psalm 81:17](#)). But Jesus points to the final fulfillment of that promise in the Eucharist. He does the same things He does at the Last Supper - He takes the loaves, pronounces a blessing of thanksgiving (literally, "eucharist"), and gives the bread to the people (see [Matthew 26:26](#)). Notice, too, that 12 baskets of bread are left over, one for each of the apostles.

These are signs that should point us to the Eucharist - in which the Church founded on the apostles continues to feed us with the living bread of His body. In this Eucharist, we are made one body with the Lord, as we hear in today's Epistle. Let us resolve again, then, to live lives worthy of such a great calling.
