

From the Heart - by Fr. Kern

I am writing this week from the airport in Denver, CO after attending a Conference called "The Amazing Parish Conference". This name

sounded slightly cheesy to me when I first heard about the conference but once I got past the name and looked at the topics and goals for the conference I became very excited. I asked Carol, our Tri-Parish parish manager, along with Deacon Chris and a couple others to attend the conference. Stephanie Stencil from St. Teresa's agreed to attend with us. The Diocese of Winona paid our entire conference fee as a scholarship/grant so we could attend.

While I probably had lower or more cynical expectations than I should have had going, (I often feel like we can throw around a lot of good ideas at these types of things but perhaps less comes from it than one would hope) I left feeling very refreshed and encouraged about how to continue to carry forth vision and utilize our parish leaders to make the best use of our planning efforts and strategy.

I am excited about what the future holds for our parishes and for each of us to make a more intentional journey and come to a more personal and deeper relationship with the Person of Jesus Christ. This is my goal for our parishes: That each parishioner might be closer to the Person of Jesus in the next year than they are now.

One of the ways I want to help us do this is through the forming of peer groups which allow us to focus on Jesus together through the reading of Scripture, Church teachings or writings, and other means to walk together in our relationship with Jesus. We give one hour to Jesus on Sunday, but so many of us would benefit immensely from having a closer group of friends who wouldn't judge us or have expectations for us to be at a certain place in our faith journey but would simply welcome us to journey with them.

Another item this conference helped me realize is the amount I utilize input from others and rely on it to make decisions. However, I also recognize that at times I don't make decisions because I don't feel like the plan is properly communicated. One fruit of this conference was to form a small team that works with the pastor and staff to assist him in strategy and input for how to implement the goals and vision of the parishes; a sort of mission advancement team that helps him strategize about what specific tasks need to be taken in order to carry forth the goals we are looking to implement. This allows for the pastoral councils to be the sounding board and event planning groups without being overly bogged down with big picture items like vision and mission. The councils then serve as an advisory or consultative body as they are meant to but not overwhelmed with strategic planning. While change is and will be inevitable in our parishes, I am confident that we can reach new depths of faith and new horizons of encounter with our Lord!

I hope by this point in my time as your pastor you realize I love you and love it here. I hope we can continue to work together to keep building the Church and growing in love with God. I hope you trust me and know that I will only work toward what I see is for the true good of the faith of each member of our parish and in that I include those in our boundaries who do not attend Sunday Mass. May the Lord continue to increase and we decrease in our parish boundaries!

Panel discussion on Pope's New Encyclical

Recently, the Center for Medical Progress, (CMP) released a video showing the senior medical director at Planned Parenthood discussing PP'S ongoing involvement in today's sale of baby body parts. 3. Contact your members of Congress and tell them you want action taken to cut all taxpayer funding of Planned Parenthood. Ask them to 1) immediately suspend all Medicaid reimbursements to Planned Parenthood, and 2) to conduct an investigation of Planned Parenthood to shut off all taxpayer money to the organization. Sunday Bible Reflections with Dr. Scott Hahn

The Wisdom of God has prepared a feast, we hear in today's First Reading. We must become like children (see [Matthew 18:3-4](#)) to hear and accept this invitation. For in every Eucharist, it is the folly of the cross that is represented and renewed.

To the world, it is foolishness to believe that the crucified Jesus rose from the dead. And for many, as for the crowds in today's Gospel, it is foolishness -- maybe even madness -- to believe that Jesus can give us His flesh to eat.

Yet Jesus repeats himself with gathering intensity in the Gospel today. Notice the repetition of the words "eat" and "drink," and "my flesh" and "my blood." To heighten the unbelievable realism of what Jesus asks us to believe, John in these verses uses, not the ordinary Greek word for eating, but a cruder term, once reserved to describe the "munching" of feeding animals.

The foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom (see [1 Corinthians 1:18-25](#)). In His foolish love, He chooses to save those who believe that His flesh is true food, His blood, true drink.

Fear of the Lord, the desire to live by His will, is the beginning of true wisdom, Paul says in today's Epistle (see [Proverbs 9:10](#)). And as we sing in today's Psalm, those who fear Him shall not want for any good thing.

Again today in the liturgy, we are called to renew our faith in the Eucharist, to forsake the foolishness of believing only what we can see with our eyes.

We approach, then, not only an altar prepared with bread and wine, but the feast of Wisdom, the banquet of heaven -- in which God our savior renews His everlasting covenant and promises to destroy death forever (see [Isaiah 25:6-9](#)).

Let us make the most of our days, as Paul says, always, in the Eucharist, giving thanks to God for everything in the name of Jesus, the bread come down from heaven.
