From the Heart - by Fr. Kern

This week headlines about Pope Francis have been in abundance. Unfortunately, more than a few of them have been misleading. This past week Pope Francis announced two separate things that made national news. First, he gave permission for priests during the coming Jubilee Year of Mercy which runs from December 8th this winter through next November to forgive the sin of abortion. While many media outlets made this sound like breaking news, this has already long been the custom in the United States in most instances. At times the Church in its understanding reserves certain serious sins to go to the bishop of a diocese to be forgiven because of the seriousness nature of the sin committed. The Church wants to teach about the gravity or seriousness of these sins and so at times has reserved the giving of absolution to the bishop in certain cases like abortion. The seal of confession is not affected in these situations. It has been the case for a number of decades in the Diocese of Winona that priests have been given permission by the bishop to forgive the sin of abortion but that only holds true for the first time the sin is confessed. It is still the case that if it was a second instance of abortion being confessed that the bishop would need to be sought for the gift of absolution of sins when abortion has been confessed a second time. While this does seem laborious and exceedingly difficult it is attempting to show the Church's pastoral care to help the person and walk with them pastorally because of the pain that has come from or gone into this difficult situation.

The second headline Pope Francis made this week was over his decision to simplify the process for annulments in the Church. Let me clarify, this did not make the process easier, it made it simpler and shorter in duration. An annulment is not a Catholic divorce or 'undoing the knot' of marriage. A petition for nullity of marriage is analogous to a court in the church which looks at the bond of marriage. By bond of marriage we do not mean the quality of marriage or how long they were together or children they had. By bond it is meant that the diocesan tribunal office are determining at the moment of consent on the day of their wedding whether the couple was ready, free, and able to carry out the duties of marriage. If they made a full yes to one another and nothing inhibited their freedom (including fear, lack of understanding, psychological misgivings, intention to be together for whole of life, open to having children, etc) then they are married and as Jesus tells us in the Scripture, man has no authority to separate (Matthew 19). If they did have something blocking their freedom to marry then the marriage might be annulled. The difficulty is proving whether the freedom was inhibited or not. With this understanding then, Pope Francis took away an automatic second review of the cases that had been happening for around 30-50 years as the number of divorces increased. This will make the process more localized and not sent off to another diocese for additional review and thus speed up the timeframe for a decision to be announced. You might have to read this paragraph a couple times to get it but this is a decision that should ultimately benefit pastors of people as they walk with them through difficult situations and heavy burdens.

Stewardship means respecting and sharing our resources as an expression of gratitude to God. It reminds us that we are the administrators, not the owners, of our assets. Christian stewardship can be identified by several meaningful characteristics, the most important is that it strengthens our relationship with God. It is a way of life. Stewardship calls us to share a portion of our time, talent, and treasure so that the Good News of Jesus Christ may be shared with those who do not know Him.

Sunday Bible Reflections with Dr. Scott Hahn

In today's Gospel, we reach a pivotal moment in our walk with the Lord. After weeks of listening to His words and witnessing His deeds, along with the disciples we're asked to decide who Jesus truly is.

Peter answers for them, and for us, too, when he declares: "You are the Messiah."

Many expected the Messiah to be a miracle worker who would vanquish Israel's enemies and restore the kingdom of David (see [John 6:15](#)).

Jesus today reveals a different portrait. He calls himself the Son of Man, evoking the royal figure Daniel saw in his heavenly visions (see [Daniel 7:13-14](#)). But Jesus' kingship is not to be of this world (see [John 18:36](#)). And the path to His throne, as He reveals, is by way of suffering and death.

Jesus identifies the Messiah with the suffering servant that Isaiah foretells in today's First Reading. The words of Isaiah's servant are Jesus' words -- as He gives himself to be shamed and beaten, trusting that God will be His help. We hear our Lord's voice again in today's Psalm, as He gives thanks that God has freed Him from the cords of death.

As Jesus tells us today, to believe that He is the Messiah is to follow His way of self-denial -- losing our lives to save them, in order to rise with Him to new life. Our faith, we hear again in today's Epistle, must express itself in works of love (see [Galatians 5:6](#)).

Notice that Jesus questions the apostles today "along the way." They are on the way to Jerusalem, where the Lord will lay down His life. We, too, are on a journey with the Lord.

We must take up our cross, giving to others and enduring all our trials for His sake and the sake of the gospel.

Our lives must be an offering of thanksgiving for the new life He has given us, until that day when we reach our destination, and walk before the Lord in the land of the living.
