Happy Independence Day Weekend. First, I want to say a special thank you to the Totus Tuus Team for their great work with our youth this week.

From teaching in the classroom to the Friday Water Fight to instructing our high schoolers on how to pray we had a great week. God blessed us with many graces and a lot of fun. A particular thanks is in order for Vicki Kunkel for being there day and evening with the team to facilitate the week as well as Becky Anderson and Cliff and Marci Anderson for hosting the teams this year during the week. Also thank you to everyone who cooked a meal or brought snacks for the week! It takes many hands to make light work. Thanks for a special week. This Sunday-Friday 17 of our youth and parish volunteers head to Catholic Heart Work Camp in Champaign, IL. We will leave Sunday morning and be ready to work hard, pray, meet new people, and have a fun week growing in our faith life. I am very excited to attend our second youth mission trip in a row this year. Thanks to Jonah Lippert our youth minister and Carol Cyr for sorting through many details to get this trip organized. Nothing is more complicated than a youth trip!

As we celebrate Independence Day again this year, I want to remind you about the need to pray and advocate for Religious Liberty. We don't see the day to day impact of how religious liberty is being threatened in our country but as I have spoken about before, the more and more that the culture goes against Christian teachings the more the public square becomes less concerned about our beliefs. This past week alone the Supreme Court of the United States refused to hear an appeal from a state of Washington Pharmacy where because of religious beliefs the pharmacy has refused to sell abortion inducing drugs and morning after pills and instead refer people to a different pharmacy. They will now be forced to either sell the drugs or face unemployment. This came just a day after striking down a pro-life law in the state of Texas that would have closed abortion clinics and saved thousands of children in the womb. If we think these are issues far removed from us we should be sure that this is not the case. The Catholic Church is under attack because it defends life, advocates the sanctity of marriage, and welcomes the immigrant. I pray for the courage of the early Church where so many willingly opposed the culture that sought to destroy the Church. The Church will persevere until Jesus' return and has for 2000 years been persecuted for its faithfulness to the teachings of Jesus Christ and His Apostles. Please add to your long list of prayers the prayer for religious liberty.

O God our Creator, from your provident hand we have received our right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. You have called us as your people and given us the right and the duty to worship you, the only true God, and your Son, Jesus Christ. Through the power and working of your Holy Spirit, you call us to live out our faith in the midst of the world, bringing the light and the saving truth of the Gospel to every corner of society. We ask you to bless us in our vigilance for the gift of religious liberty. Give us the strength of mind and heart to readily defend our freedoms when they are threatened; give us courage in making our voices heard on behalf of the rights of your Church and the freedom

Sunday Bible Reflections with Dr. Scott Hahn

Jesus has a vision in this week's Gospel—Satan falling like lightning from the sky, the enemy vanquished by the missionary preaching of His Church.

Sent out by Jesus to begin gathering the nations into the harvest of divine judgment (see [Isaiah 27:12-13](#); [Joel 4:13](#)), the 70 are a sign of the continuing mission of the Church.

Carrying out the work of the 70, the Church proclaims the coming of God's kingdom, offers His blessings of peace and mercy to every household on earth—"every town and place He intended to visit."

Our Lord's tone is solemn today. For in the preaching of the Church "the kingdom of God is at hand," the time of decision has come for every person. Those who do not receive His messengers will be doomed like Sodom. But those who believe will find peace and mercy, protection and nourishment in the bosom of the Church, the Mother Zion we celebrate in this week's beautiful First Reading, the "Israel of God" Paul blesses in this week's Epistle.

The Church is a new family of faith (see [Galatians 6:10](#)) in which we receive a new name that will endure forever (see [Isaiah 66:22](#)), a name written in heaven.

In this week's Psalm we sing of God's "tremendous deeds among men" throughout salvation history. But of all the works of God, none has been greater than what He has wrought by the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ. Changing the sea into dry land was but an anticipation and preparation for our passing over, for what Paul calls the "new creation."

And as the exodus generation was protected in a wilderness of serpents and scorpions (see [Deuteronomy 8:15](#)), He has given His Church power now over "the full force of the Enemy." Nothing will harm us as we make our way through the wilderness of this world, awaiting the Master of the harvest, awaiting the day when all on earth will shout joyfully to the Lord, sing praise to the glory of His name.

Reflections on Religious Freedom

Where the principle of religious freedom is not only proclaimed in words or simply incorporated in law but also given sincere and practical application, there the Church succeeds in achieving a stable situation of right as well as of fact and the independence which is necessary for the fulfillment of her divine mission. This independence is precisely what the authorities of the Church claim in society. At the same time, the Christian faithful, in common with all other men, possess the civil right not to be hindered in leading their lives in accordance with their conscience. Therefore, a harmony exists between the freedom of the Church and the religious freedom which is to be recognized as the right of all men and communities and sanctioned by constitutional law. *Declaration on Religious Liberty, Second Vatican Council (Dignitatis Humanae), no. 13 December 7, 1965*

While insisting upon the religious freedom of the Church, the Second Vatican Council Fathers do not wish to give the impression that in some manner the Catholic Church is special when it comes to religious liberty. Thus, the Council first states above that where the principle of religious liberty is present, the Church is able to peaceably fulfill her divine mission. It is this amicable relationship between herself and civil authorities that the Church always wishes to pursue and ensure. In the light of this, the Church also champions the religious and civil rights of all so that all people can live "their lives in accordance with their conscience." In this way there is no conflict with what the Church demands for herself and what she demands for others—the freedom to follow one's conscience in matters religious. This religious freedom for all is what the Council once more believes should be acknowledged and sanctioned within the constitutional law of countries.

In the United States, religious freedom is protected in the Constitution, as the Council desires. Are those constitutional protections enough? Are they growing stronger or weaker in our society today? What else, apart from the law, can strengthen or weaken religious liberty? What should Catholics do to defend and foster religious liberty in America today? What have Catholics done in the past when religious liberty was threatened?
