From the Heart by Fr. Jason Kern

A most holy and blessed Christmas to you and your family! This Advent has been a beautiful preparation for our Lord to enter our lives in a fuller and deeper way. I am grateful to spend this Christmas as your pastor. The Lord has blessed me in so many ways and you are most certainly a great blessing in my life. While I know that this past year has been difficult as we have changed Mass times and undergone transitions with Faith Formation, we have seen opportunities to work together as well. I am very pleased with the direction that certain things have gone but am still unsatisfied with others. Thank you for your patience with my leadership and my juggling of many different circumstances and situations. I am grateful to have this time as your pastor knowing that while we may not like everything that has transitioned, I remain confident that the faith of our people is being strengthened by many of these changes. Please keep your mind and heart focused on Jesus Christ and prayer and ask Him to bless our efforts to grow in love of Jesus and the Catholic faith and to hand it on to the next generation.

I pray that as you spend time with family and friends celebrating the holy day of our Lord's birth, you will call to mind how beautiful a mystery it is that Jesus has rescued us from sin even prior to His death on the Cross. The Cross and Resurrection is the final word, the saving action. Yet, from the moment of the fall of Adam and Eve, God planned a rescue mission that is fulfilled not in some magical act or fairy tale ending. God's plan was fulfilled by Jesus taking flesh and becoming one with us. God's plan to save us is to unite Himself to us. God enters our lives not just to make us feel okay now that He is here, but by uniting Divinity to our human nature, He has elevated our humanity to now participate in His Divinity.

The author and speaker George Weigel says it well, "Loneliness is the modern predicament and it's getting worse... Social media is no antidote to this isolation, for tweets or Facebook postings (not to mention comment threads beneath online articles) are not substitutes for real conversation. In many cases, I fear, they intensify the loneliness and the self-absorption from which it often springs. Christmas reminds us what Christians have to say to this pervasive loneliness. We say "God is with us," as throughout the Christmas season we celebrate the divine answer to the Advent plea, "O come, o come Emmanuel." That plea did not go unrequited. We see the answer to it in the crèches in our homes. God is with us, not in awe and majesty, but in that most accessible of human forms, the baby who reaches out for our embrace. God is Emmanuel, God-with-us, in the midst of our lives, not outside them. A few years ago I began collecting Fontanini crèche figures, and while the display is

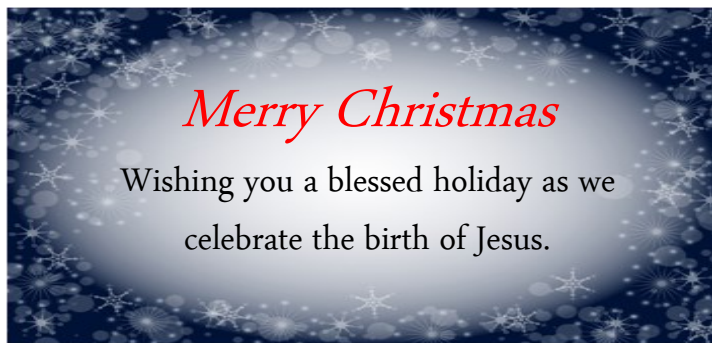

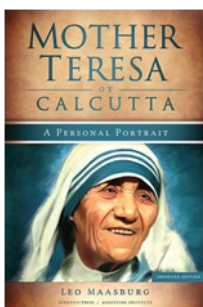

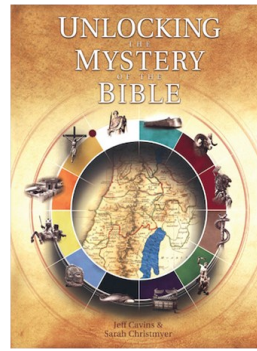
Thank you to all who helped package food for Jesus Food or provided monetary donations to cover the cost of the food. We were able to package food to feed 11,323 starving children!

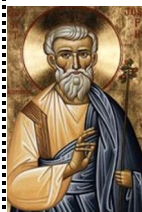

Christmas

Reflections:

The Father has given us his Son: for this indescribable gift we are full of joy.

The traditional "Christmas tree" is a very ancient custom which exalts the value of life, as in winter the evergreen becomes a sign of undying life. In general, the tree is decorated and Christmas gifts are placed under it. The symbol is also eloquent from a typically Christian point of view: It reminds us of the "tree of life" (see Genesis 2:9), representation of Christ, God's supreme gift to humanity.

The message of the Christmas tree, therefore, is that life is "ever green" if one gives: not so much material things, but of oneself: in friendship and sincere affection, and fraternal help and forgiveness, in shared time and reciprocal listening.

Lord, in this holy season of prayer and song and laughter, we praise you for the great wonders you have sent us: for shining star and angel's song, for infant's cry in lowly manger. We praise you for the Word made flesh in a little Child. We behold his glory, and are bathed in its radiance.
